SUBJECT: McKinney-Vento Summer School Information

Summer school offers an especially valuable opportunity for students to make up for lost time, re-take failed courses, gain extra credits and work toward timely graduation. As the end of the school year approaches, and as your Local Educational Agency (“LEA”) prepares for summer school, your plans should take into consideration the summer school needs of children and youth experiencing homelessness.

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 USC §11431 *et seq.*, “McKinney-Vento”) applies to students in a wide range of temporary living situations, including shelters and emergency or transitional housing; students living in hotels, motels, trailer parks, or camp grounds due to lack of alternative adequate housing; **and also to students who are “doubled up” with friends or relatives due to loss of housing or economic hardship.** Unaccompanied youth who live in the types of arrangements described above are also included under the protection of the law. Students who are protected by McKinney-Vento are entitled to immediate enrollment in their school of origin or their local school.

Access to Summer School:

Students in temporary housing have important rights related to summer school. All students who experience homelessness and who are required to attend summer school to advance to the next grade or to graduate on time with their peers *must* be provided the opportunity to do so. If your district does not offer a summer school program, but permanently housed students are able to attend summer school in a neighboring district for a fee, students in temporary housing should be afforded this same opportunity, and they should not be charged the fee. Instead, your district may be asked to cover the summer school fee for such students.

When homeless students enroll in summer school, the LEA must provide transportation, if such transportation is provided to permanently housed students who attend summer school programs.

In addition, McKinney-Vento also requires that LEAs eliminate barriers to homeless students' full participation and success in school. With this in mind, if a homeless student is advised to attend summer school to ensure academic success, the LEA must eliminate barriers to the student's enrollment and participation in the summer school program.

Accordingly, a homeless student who is enrolled in the LEA should be provided with transportation to summer school if the student needs summer school to ensure academic success and the lack of such transportation would be a barrier to the student's attendance, even if the district does not provide transportation to permanently housed students.

Title I set-aside funds may be used to help offset some of the above costs. Homeless students are automatically eligible for Title I, Part A services, even if they do not attend a Title I school.

LEAs must also set aside funds to provide comparable services to homeless students who are not attending Title I schools. In many cases, these funds may be used to provide summer school transportation and educationally related support services to children in temporary housing where they live. Note, the "no-supplanting" provisions in Title I, Part A prohibit LEAs from using Title I, Part A funds to support activities that the LEA would already be required to provide.

The following is a partial list of services to which Title I, Part A set aside funding can be applied: tutoring, counseling, school supplies, school uniforms, transportation once the student is permanently housed, and other services that are not ordinarily provided to permanently housed Title I students and are not available from other sources. (Title I of ESEA Section 1115(b)(3)). In some circumstances, the Local Department of Social Services (LDSS) is required to provide transportation to and from school for students who are placed by the LDSS in emergency housing outside their designated school district. If the LDSS declines to provide transportation for a student attending summer school and if lack of summer school is a barrier to academic success, the designated school district should provide the student with summer school transportation.

Appointing a Homeless Liaison:

All LEAs must ensure that there is a designated LEA Liaison (also known as a Homeless Liaison) year-round. Due to summer vacation schedules, many LEAs may need to appoint a special interim LEA Liaison for the summer months if the Liaison for the academic year is unavailable. LEAs should provide the summer Liaison's contact information to NYS-TEACHS by visiting <http://www.nysteachs.org/liaisons/contact.html> and filling in the required fields. Please check "Summer Liaison ONLY" for staff members who will be the liaison only for the summer months. Updated contact information should be provided before the end of the current school year.
