High-Tech Security Features

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 Describe how you intend to use Smart Schools Bond Act funds to install high-tech security features in school buildings and on school campuses.

West Irondequoit School community believes that their students deserve a safe and happy school environment to attend every day and that it helps them to be successful learners.

One of the components that contributes to a safe and a secure environment is a robust video security system. A system that includes modern cameras and a video storage system that is reliable and large enough for the demands of a district like West Irondequoit. In Phase 1, West Irondequoit replaced components of their video security system. The original system had a limited number of cameras and a video storage server that is older than a significant number of the students. The cameras also had very low resolution and the server could only store video records for a limited amount of time. The upgrades by West Irondequoit were the first steps to resolve these issues. The cameras have the appropriate resolutions for their task allowing the staff reviewing incidents on the system to be able to see details and help them get an accurate understanding of what happened. Additionally, the video recording servers have adequate capacity to store video records for an extended period of time and also the capacity to archive specific events indefinitely for future reference.

In Phase 2 West Irondequoit wishes to expand their video security system to include additional cameras. The district has studied their buildings and identified multiple locations that have no coverage and pose a vulnerability. The district is also proposing to purchase additional server capacity to eliminate shared servers and provide fail over reliability.

In this application West Irondequoit also proposes to upgrade their entry security. Relying on traditional keys creates a vulnerability created by the possible duplication of physical keys or lost or misplaced physical keys. The use of swipe cards allows the management of door access to individuals with almost no risk of lost or duplicated cards. Door access can be managed for each individual. Which building, which doors, and what time frames. Teachers and instructional staff could have access during certain hours. Coaches and non instructional staff might have another. Building administrators and custodial staff could have appropriate building access that is more flexible. In the event of a lost card or misplaced card, that card can be disabled immediately making the plastic swipe worthless. In the event that a staff member leaves the district or even a specific building, the rights can be changed immediately. Finally, the swipe system can be linked to the video security system. In the event that a card is swiped outside of hours, the video security system can record the person entering confirming the correct individual is using the correct key.

The final component of the Phase 2 application is an upgrade to Emergency Classroom Communication. The existing systems are antiquated analog systems. They have been extended and spliced until they are not very reliable. In fact, the district has a risk that some locations will not receive appropriate instructions in the event of an emergency. Imagine announcing a lock down situation and some classrooms not hearing the notification. Students could walk out of their classrooms and be confronted by an unauthorized visitor to the building. The upgrade is IP based. The system can be programed so the district is notified in the event one of the speakers isn't working. The units regenerate the messages so that the units at the distant locations in the building provide the same strength of audio as the closest.
